

Who are Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetists (CRNAs)?

- Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetists (CRNAs) are Advanced Practice Registered Nurses who safely administer more than 34 million anesthetics to patients each year in the United States, according to the American Association of Nurse Anesthetists (AANA) 2014 Practice Profile Survey
- ➤ There are over 950 CRNAs practicing in Kentucky
- ➤ CRNAs have been providing quality anesthesia for over 150 years
- In the Commonwealth, CRNAs are the sole providers of anesthesia in <u>31 out of 73 counties</u> that have hospitals and surgery centers, mostly in rural Kentucky
- ➤ Prior to graduate or doctorate anesthesia education, CRNAs have a Bachelor's Degree in Nursing and at least one year of nursing experience in an Intensive Care Unit. CRNAs are qualified to make independent judgments regarding anesthesia care based on their education, licensure, and certification
- > CRNAs are the primary anesthesia providers for rural America and the Armed Forces

CRNAs have a long record of providing access to safe, cost-effective anesthesia care throughout the Commonwealth.
